
Application Information for the Juneau History Grant 2011/2012

What is a Juneau History Grant?

The Juneau History Grant is a monetary grant (up to \$1,000) made possible by an endowment from the Juneau Centennial Committee. The grant provides funding for projects by local citizens of all ages who wish to research, write, photograph, or in some other way document, preserve or improve access to the history of the Juneau area. A project might consist of performances, public presentations, a research paper, bibliography, model, booklet, photographs, recordings, or utilize computer technology. Individuals, classes and organizations are invited to apply. Proposals on all topics are welcome.

How will grants be chosen?

Applications will be judged by a panel selected by the Juneau History Grant Committee, based upon the following criteria:

- ◆ 40 points for projects that are of historical value to the greater Juneau community;
- ◆ 30 points for projects which may be accomplished within the stated timeline; that will produce a tangible product that will be shared in a public forum (see examples in first paragraph, above);
- ◆ 20 points for realistic and balanced budgets;
- ◆ 10 points for historic objectivity as indicated by proposed sources and methodology.

Applications that are LATE, HAND-WRITTEN, or INCOMPLETE will NOT be considered.

How do I apply?

Applications must be received by the City Museum by **4:00 p.m., Monday, June 13, 2011.**

Only completed applications will be considered. Clearly describe your planned project and answer each question in the **summary of project** section.

Mail **SIX COPIES** of your application to the Juneau History Grant Committee, % Juneau-Douglas City Museum, 155 South Seward Street, Juneau, AK 99801. You may also hand deliver **SIX COPIES** of your TYPED application to the Juneau-Douglas City Museum, located at Fourth and Main Streets.

Please keep a copy of your application for your own files. All applicants will be notified by **July 15, 2011** of acceptance or rejection.

Please describe why the purchase of equipment is vital to completing your Juneau history project. **The Committee maintains that the Juneau History Grant does NOT cover administrative and/or contractual costs** associated with this project. If this project is part of a larger project, please include the budget for the larger project. (Please be as specific as possible, i.e. for printing costs break down into cost per copy X estimated number of copies, etc.)

Juneau History Grant Suggested Themes

These are just a few examples of the types of themes that might be used:

ETHNIC DIVERSITY: Many people from many lands settled in the Juneau area and contributed to our history and culture.

AAK'W K̄WÁAN AND T'AAKU PEOPLE: Origins, village sites, genealogies, oral histories.

CIVIC, SERVICE AND FRATERNAL ORGANIZATIONS: and their impact on Juneau:
BPOE, IOOF, Pioneers, ANB/ANS.

CHURCHES AND RELIGIOUS ORGANIZATIONS: Salvation Army, Sisters of St. Anne,
St. Nicholas Orthodox Church.

NEIGHBORHOODS: Architecture, historic preservation, building techniques.

ARCHITECTURE: Styles, historic preservation, building techniques.

INDUSTRIAL HERITAGE: Logging/milling, fishing/canning, mining, etc.

JUNEAU AND WAR: Attitudes, values, effects, et cetera: Spanish American War,
World War I, World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Desert Storm.

AGRICULTURE: Fox farming, dairies, farms and gardens, greenhouses.

HOLIDAYS: Traditional celebrations in the Juneau area.

RECREATION AND SPORTS: Theater, movies, balls, hunting and fishing, hiking and
mountain climbing, music, picnics, camping, home entertainment.

TRANSPORTATION THROUGH THE YEARS: Canoes, snowshoes, steamships, ferries,
planes, cars, horses, roads, bridges.

MARITIME: Ships, shipwrecks, lighthouses, US Coast Guard.

IMAGE MAKERS: Photographers, artists, map makers.

JUNEAU AS STATE CAPITAL: Government, capital move, architecture.

RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES: Native votes, women's votes, Elizabeth Peratrovich, liquor laws.

DISCOVERY AND EXPLORATION: Early explorers, map makers, botanists.

DISASTERS: Fires and fire fighters, mud slides, avalanches.
